


WHAT IT MEANS TO BE A MAR

The United States Marine Corps was established on November 10th, 1775, to augment Naval forces in the Revolutionary War. Capt. Samuel Nicholas set up a recruiting station at Tun Tavern in Philadelphia, PA. which has become the official birthplace of the USMC. In the past 250 years, the Marine Corps has made many a mark on history. The first major campaign for Marines in 1805, was the battle of Derna, in Tripoli. Barbary pirates controlled much of the Mediterranean Sea and demanded "tribute" from other nations to be able to use those shipping routes. When the Pasha of Tripoli declared war on the US for not paying the tribute, President Thomas Jefferson sent the Marines to win the war and win it they did, at the battle of Derna. This was the first time an American flag was raised over foreign soil. It was also where the Marines adopted the nickname, "Leatherneck" from the tall leather collars they wore to prevent the pirates from slitting their throats.

In 1847, during the Battle of Chapultepec, Marines and soldiers took part in the first US amphibious landing at the Port of Veracruz. 1200 men, 400 of them Marines, landed on Mexican soil to stage the invasion. From there, they moved inland to Mexico City, where after losing 90% of their forces, took Chapultepec Castle, which was known to US forces as "The Halls of Montezuma". The USMC not only inspired the opening line to the Marine Corps Hymn at the battle of Chapultepec, but the red "Blood Stripe" you see on the blue trousers of Marine NCOs is in honor of the Marines who fought and lost their lives during this battle. In 1918, Marines fought at the Battle of Belleau Wood, defending France from German invasion. Marines fought so

hard and killed so many, that the Germans graced us with





words are the foundation of what it means to be a Marine. There are two more words that Marines live by, they are Semper Fidelis, which is Latin for "Always Faithful". It is the motto of the Marine Corps and inscribed on the banner held by the eagle on The Eagle, Globe & Anchor (EGA) of our Marine Corps flag. Semper Fidelis is the promise that every Marine makes to the Corps, and the promise that the Marine Corps makes to every Marine. I served in our beloved Corps from 1994-1998 at Marine Corps Air Station Tustin in California as a Military Police Officer. Last year I was able to round up 13 Marines who served with me at Tustin for the best reunion I have ever experienced. At the end of this month, we are hosting a Veterans Weekend. We have invited members from every branch of military service. There will be an especially large group of Marines who served at MCAS Tustin with me. Tustin was our home for much of our time in the Corps. It was a small Marine helicopter base that featured two large wooden hangars (300'wide, 1000' long, 160' high). Tustin was originally built to house blimps in WWII for Pacific coast reconnaissance. Then, the base was known as the Lighter Than Air (LTA) base. Located in beautiful Southern California, Tustin was five miles from MCAS El Toro which based the fixed wing aircraft. During the years that we were there, the Marine Corps was transferring all the units from El Toro and Tustin down to Miramar, an old Navy base (Marines never get new stuff) due to the Defense Base Closure Act of 1990. In July of 1999, my brothers locked the gate. They were the last Marines to serve at Tustin. Hey Krayer! I bet you didn't see that one coming when you got your orders. To these Marines, I say thank you! Thank you for making the trip. Thank you for keeping in touch after all these years. Thank you for the many great memories you all were a part of some 30 years ago and thank you for the memories we continue to make. I hope you have an OUTSTANDING weekend and safe travels here and back. Ooh-Rah and Semper Fi!

News on the Water

The most common question I get this time of the year is, "When are you going to turn the water on?" I normally look at the extended weather forecast to make my decision as to when we will get water to the campsites. However, this year, it's not up to me.

I know this will inconvenience many of your efforts with getting your sites ready for the Summer, but we will not be able to turn the water on until April 30th. New regulations from the county are preventing us from turning on the water before the official opening date of our campground, which is May 1st. I am not happy about this.

If you are coming out to the campground to work on your site, you are always welcome to use our shower house. You can also bring gallons of water to fill your freshwater tank or pull water from the creek. I am also starting a sign-up sheet for folks to join our Poor Farmer's Bucket Brigade. 30-40 of us will line up and pass buckets of water to each site we can reach. This will not only get water to the campsites, but it will be good exercise, as well as a great way to meet new people.

If you're not interested in being part of our bucket brigade, you are always welcome to disregard this entire article, cause April fools. I am sure we will get a call or two from those who fail to read all the way to the end. Water will be on soon. Let's Go Campin'!

Things to Remember when Getting your Campsite Ready for the Summer.

- The camping season starts on May 1st. Please be patient with our workers as they will be working to get the grounds ready. Even on the weekends.
- ONLY HOUSEHOLD TRASH IN THE DUMPSTERS!!! If you have furniture, yard
 ornaments, decking or anything that is not "Household trash" please take those things off
 property to dispose of them. We will be monitoring the dumpsters.
- Ricky has been working to condition the campsites that need it. If you have any issues with your site, please report them to the Part's Store rep and we will get it done.
- Any new construction of platforms or steps need to be approved by Jimmy Weaver or Mike Till. Remember that platforms must be free floating, treated wood, and no railings.
- Grass seed is available with our grounds crew. See Jimmy if you need grass seed.
- If you see any issues with your RV that are too much for you, call Justin with our Service Dept. His schedule is filling up fast so he may need a few days to get to you.
- Get your golf cart insurance paperwork to us so Amy can print you a Golf Cart Permit tag that must be displayed on your cart.
- Be mindful of your neighbors as you are moving in. Respect their sites and space.
- If you have people coming to help you, please emphasize that the speed limit is 5MPH in the campground.
- Finally, if you are moving sites, please do not waste any time getting moved. We have other campers that are waiting for their site to get cleared off before they can move in.

Thank you for another year of Poor Farmer's camping. We have a fun summer schedule planned and a few new campers coming in for you all to meet. If you have questions, concerns, or just want to give a compliment on how well this place is being managed, please don't hesitate to let us know.
